In the Pub and the Laundromat

Led by Rev. Susan Ohlidal and Rev. Meredyth Wessman-Ward

Here is a place to share stories about the Spirit's work outside the walls of any church.

Susan put on her clerical collar one evening, went to her local watering hole, bought herself a beer and sat down at the bar. Soon, she was engaging in all sorts of conversations that turned into regular encounters Susan calls Pub Theology. These have continued during the pandemic.

Meredyth took to the streets of Worcester and headed for the laundromat, where she listened to the stories of people doing their washing. This led to a storefront ministry involving folks who might never think about walking through the red doors of an Episcopal Church.

Ministry with Young Adults

Led by Rev. Dr. Paul Carling

What are college students looking for? What are Millennials' attitudes towards spirituality? It's not that they do not have questions about faith; it's that they are looking for dialog that feels authentic and speaks to their everyday experience. And it can include our Episcopal traditions!

Paul, who has just retired after building up student participation as Chaplain of the Episcopal Church at Yale, will share his insights and help us connect the dots on how to access authentic ministry and meaning with college students and young adults.

Music Workshop:

Can These Bones Live? Vital Song = Vital Church

Led by Dent Davidson

Dent, a dynamic musician deeply rooted in the Episcopal tradition, will help us look at and listen to our rich musical storehouse with fresh eyes and ears, to see how we can harness the power of music to engage a new generation of spiritual seekers – and even re-energize veteran worshipers.

Come experience our musical tradition being infused with new ideas and energy that use the people and other resources we already have available in our parishes.

2:00-2:55 pm

Letting Go of Our Fear of Failure

Led by Rev. Lorenzo Lebrija and David Zahl

Lorenzo and David will help us focus on how we access the courage to consider something new in our parish ministries. For them, the secret is to approach ministry with a spirit of play (and playing with the Spirit) and learning how to effectively gather the insights we need to inspire new ministry initiatives.

The session will begin with a centering exercise aimed at helping us see and appreciate what may look like small and seemingly insignificant signs all around us. There will be ample time allowed to answer your questions and concerns.

We will close by considering how all that we do comes wrapped in God's grace.

Ministry with Teenagers & Youth

Led by Rev. Matt Lindeman

Whether we like it or not, a leader's personality has a lot to do with how she or he will connect with a group of teens and young adults.

Matt will lead us through his own experiences in the Peace Corps and as a youth minister. He will suggest ways in which we can realistically assess our own strengths and weaknesses as ministry leaders, and how to count up the assets in our midst – what Matt calls "matching the hatch."

We will allow plenty of time for questions and for sharing wisdom and stories.

Music Workshop

In Search of our Sound: Balancing Innovation and Tradition Led by Rev. Dr. Rick Bauer

The traditional and the contemporary always live in tension – especially when it comes to the music we like to hear in worship.

Rick will discuss practical and theological approaches to discernment around musical choices for church musicians and worship leaders. Transitioning from a long career in contemporary music as a performer and recording artist, and now serving as rector of a largely conservative congregation, Rick will help us consider how we can strike balances that honor the rich musical legacy of the past while respecting opportunities for evangelism through musical exploration.

Overcoming obstacles about evangelism Led by Rev. Titus Presler

As members of the Body of Christ we are called to verbal proclamation of the Good News. To incorporate proclamation in our pilgrimage in the Way of Love is to fully live into God's mission.

Titus will share his wisdom and insights as we gather to consider the words heard and exchanged in the day's workshops. There may still be more questions than answers in our midst, but we will be reminded that our journey in faith has the sharing of stories at its core.
