Do I have enough?

If you ask the students in a grade one classroom, who can sing, or who can draw and even who can dance, if not all the hands go up, then at least the majority would to each question. Twelve years later and ask those students the same three questions, you will see vastly different results. The question now is: "What's the difference that made that difference." The answer: as each child grew, enough people told them they couldn't sing, draw, or dance, and they came to believe it, so they didn't. (We are not talking stellar performance, but the acknowledgement that I can do it.)

What people believe about themselves, their abilities and/or their career, friendships and even their church makes a tremendous difference. If one believes their career is a "dead end job" then they perform only at the minimal level. If one believes their career makes a difference, then they perform optimally. Years ago, I watched an educational film titled, "What you are is Where you Were When." It was fascinating. The premise is what one experiences in the formative years has a lasting influence for the remainder of their life. For example, those whose formative years were during the great depression of the 1930's, learned the need to save whatever money they had and to make do with meager resources. They probably also came to never trust the bank! It was the age of darning socks, patches on the knees of trousers and the time of hand-me-downs. In affluent and abundant times, the age of use-once plastic grocery bags, the throw away mentality reigned. Who darns socks now? Growing up in a home based on scarcity or abundance influenced your attitudes for the rest of your life.

This is also true within organizations, including the church. We all know the story of Jesus feeding the multitudes. Jesus has a concern for them, and the disciples say, "where will we get enough bread?" They were operating from a scarcity model. Jesus asks about what supplies they had on hand, which turned out to be some loaves of bread and a few fish. Our Lord aware of God's abundance in creation, knew he could risk using the disciples' limited resources, and instructed the crowd to sit down. And you know the rest of the story – there was even leftovers for the disciples' lunch the next day.

People who have vast resources of wealth but operate from a scarcity model feel they never have enough. Those who use the abundance model, readily share what they have. So, the question to ask personally and corporately is what model do you hold as your guiding principle.

Remember though, God will never ask how much money you have, but will ask what you did with the money you have.

Roofing Project Update

The roof has now been inspected for substances that may need special handling when working on the roof. These reports, along with other information about the roof, are located in a binder at the back of the church. The architect's drawing of our roofing system is also located there. The committee, with input from the architects and engineers, weighed the pros and cons of the various types of metal roofing available and have chosen a standing seam type of metal roof. Cost and safety were the main determining factors for choosing this type of roof. The cost difference between a standing seam and a slate look metal roof is approximately \$75,000. The snow guard system with a standing seam roof is better at preventing snow and ice from falling at our entrances. We encourage you to look at the information in the binder. Please feel free to approach any committee member with questions you might have. The members of the committee are Shannon Bott, Terry Dragomatz, Frank McGilvery, Steve Rowe, Bill Reitsma, Margaret Lapierre and Barb Wotton.
